The Southwest Wisconsin Technical College Foundation provides donors with flexible opportunities to give:

- Greater College Fund This allows the Southwest Wisconsin Technical College Foundation to allocate contributions to the area of greatest need at the time the gift is given.
- Restricted Gifts A gift that is designated for a specific purpose at the time the gift is given.
- Endowment To establish an endowment fund, a gift of \$10,000 or greater needs to be provided. Disbursements from an endowment will be made from the net investment income earned according to the criteria established by each individual endowment. The fund principal is perpetual.

# STUDENTS DEPEND ON EMERGENCY LOAN PROGRAMS

This year students attending Southwest Wisconsin Technical College will ask for over \$2.4 million to support their educational goals. These funds will be realized through monies from loans and grants. Along with the financial obstacles students face when achieving their educational goals, students are also faced with unexpected costs when emergency situations arise. To assist in these situations, the Foundation has developed two emergency loan programs. The programs were made possible through generous gifts provided by donors who understand the importance of providing no interest emergency loans to students. These donors understand that without an emergency loan fund, students may have to leave school. The first of the two emergency loan programs was started nearly 20 years ago and has grown significantly. This fund is supported by many individuals through payroll deductions and cash donations. Annually, this emergency loan program provides nearly \$28,000 to students through a revolving loan basis. The second emergency loan program was developed in 2003 specifically for students who are residents of Richland County. To date 23 applicants have received funding, assisting Richland County students in emergency situations.

The Foundation would like to thank the Southwest Wisconsin Technical College Financial Aid Department for their assistance in administering the programs, the Southwest Tech Counselors for their assistance with the Richland County Emergency Loan program, and the donors who have made these programs possible.

#### SOUTHWEST TECH STAFF BENEFIT THROUGH STAFF DEVELOPMENT FUND

Over the last four years, staff members of Southwest Wisconsin Technical College have submitted 72 applications for funding consideration. The Foundation was able to fund 36 of those requests for a total of \$14,062. To date the funding for the professional development program has come from individual donors, staff members, and the Foundation's unrestricted account (Greater College Fund).


The College has limited funds for professional development opportunities. The College commits resources to the de-




Brian Kitelinger, Emergency Services Support, attended the seminar "How to Balance Priorities and Manage Multiple Projects."

velopment of staff members each year in order to keep curriculum current and skills updated; however, only a small percentage of the need is met. In order to provide employers with graduates who are knowledgeable in current methods and technologies for business, staff members must keep themselves knowledgeable in their related fields. This is accomplished partially by continuous reading and research by individual staff members,

but must be enhanced periodically through seminars, conferences, and specialized training. Professional development activities require a commitment of resources to pay costs such as registration/training fees and travel. Some training opportunities are only available out of state and further increase costs. Budgetary restrictions have significantly reduced the opportunities provided to staff members for professional development. Providing staff members with the opportunity to enhance their skills by experiencing hands-on training, exposure to new technology, or networking with peer professionals provides the basis for stronger programs. Each year the Foundation honors a Contributor of the Year. This year's Contributor of the Year was Paul Cutting. Mr. Cutting has been an instrumental part of the College since he began teaching in 1990. Mr. Cutting is very dedicated to his students, continually looking for ways to increase their educational experiences. He extended his impact on the educational advancement of his students when he worked diligently to establish the Agribusiness PAS (Postsecondary Agricultural Students) Endowment Fund.
